Judge bars evidence

ESTANCIA — District Judge Santiago Campos today ruled in favor of a defense motion to suppress certain items of evidence seized by police from Escuela y Colegio Tonantzin during the daylight hours of Sept. 4.

"I feel that after the premises were secured...in the daylight hours, if there was going to be a search conducted that should have been done under a search warrant," Campos said.

The ruling, made by the judge shortly before noon today prohibits the District Attorney's Office from introducing a parcel of guns and bullets, marijuana and a Mexican flag into the trial of the Santa Fe Seven.

The seven defendants are charged with assault with intent to commit a violent felony in connection with a post-sundown gunbattle with police on Sept. 3.

Earlier, a Santa Fe Police captain testified here today that he didn't consider Escuela y Colegio Tonantzin an "active crime scene" when he left Chicano school early in the morning of September 4.

Capt. George Craig said he left only two of his officers at the school, site of a gun battle the night of Sept. 3, upon his departure at about 4 a.m. the next morning.

"I felt that under the circumstances two people could take care of the situation," said Craig, who was shift commander at the time.

Under defense questioning, Craig said that he didn't consider the school to be an active crime scene when he left.

Craig was testifying in the second day of a juryless hearing on the admissability of evidence which has interrupted the trial of the Santa Fe Seven charged with assault with intent to commit a violent felony in connection with a three-hour shoot out with police.

The suppression hearing comes in response to a defense move to prohibit the district attorney's office from introducing certain evidence seized during the daylight hours of Sept. 4.

According to the defense, the school was secured by police at about midnight Sept. 3

and the warrantless search the following day was illegal.

The prosecution contends that the school site was the object of a "continuing" legal search in that it was "an active crime scene."

Also testifying at the hearing were Assistant Chief Fernando Mier and Capt. Joseph Gorman, both of the Santa Fe Police; J. P. Leyenvecker, title officer for the Archdiocese of Santa Fe; and George Rivera, a surveyor.
