

Shooting case to SF jury

Santa Fe District Attorney's office expects to present evidence to the county grand jury Tuesday in the case of 11 members of a Chicano group charged Tuesday with assault with intent to commit a violent felony.

Assistant District Attorney Bruce Kaufman said Saturday the state hopes to get grand jury indictments against those charged in the gun battle at Escuela Colegio Tonantzin which resulted in injuries to three people including two policemen and the death of a teenaged Galisteo girl.

Another source away from the DA's office said at least one contributor to the school and associated organizations was a person in California with a "questionable background."

Other individuals who have contributed to the school's operation are from Colorado and Chicago, the source said. No organizations were named.

The school's files are presently held by law enforcement officials pending a subpoena by the Santa Fe County Grand Jury. A motion to quash the subpoena has been filed by on the files attorneys for representatives of the school.

Geronimo Gardunio, 30, co-director of the school, who was arrested by Santa Fe police following the gunbattle Monday at the school, issued a statement aimed at preventing additional violence in the wake of the death of 19-year-old Linda Montoya of Galisteo who died Thursday of gunshot wounds received in Monday's shootout.

Gardunio said he "would do everything possible to prevent more deaths and violence." In addition, he said he would work "to keep things cool and calm among my people."

A .38 caliber bullet recovered during an autopsy on the body of Miss Montoya was

turned over Friday to a state police ballistics expert for analysis. Kaufman said Saturday the ballistics tests had not been completed.

A rosary for Miss Montoya is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. today at Block's Mortuary. The funeral is set for 10 a.m. Monday in Galisteo where she will be buried.

Miss Montoya was not a member of the school group, Kaufman said. Onesimo Montoya of Galisteo, father of the girl, said she had been in Santa Fe Monday night for Fiesta activities.

About 75 to 100 persons attended a quiet mass Saturday morning at St. Anne's

Catholic Church for Miss Montoya celebrated by Father Lorenzo Ruiz.

A district judge Friday reduced bonds for two of the 10 persons charged in the shooting.

Judge Thomas Donnelly reduced to \$10,000 the surety bonds on Eugene Romero, 20, and Jose (Johnny) Morfin, a 20-year-old art teacher at the self-styled school occupying the convent which a Catholic order of sisters had vacated last June 6.

Judge Donnelly disqualified himself from hearing the case of Gardunio, whose ex-wife is Donnelly's secretary.

City-county master land use plans to be aired on Monday

County Manager Don Sandoval says he will propose a joint city-county funding plan to develop a comprehensive master land use plan for the county and the city as well as zoning regulations.

Sandoval said he would propose the Plan at tomorrow night's meeting of the Santa Fe County Commission.

"We have been talking about this kind of thing for a long time. We now believe we have the money, and the county and the city seem ready for it," Sandoval said.

Under the plan, which would cost approximately \$62,000, the city and county would jointly hire a planner, assistant planner, draftsman and secretary to develop a comprehensive land use plan within one year.

Sandoval and City Manager Philip Baca have worked together to draft the plan because the county and the city share

many joint planning problems.

A breakdown of the proposed budget shows that about \$35,500 of the money would be used for salaries, \$6,000 would be used for equipment and supplies and \$20,080 would be used to pay special consultants.

Under this category about \$10,000 would be used for county hydrological studies, \$5,000 for engineering

"We know that in the very near future both the city and the county are going to be faced with some tremendous planning and development problems," Sandoval said.

"This joint planning gives us a chance to develop together and makes more sense," he said.

The county wants to use \$44,000 in federal revenue sharing funds, plus about \$4,500 in local general fund money. If the city puts in about \$4,500 also, this would make the program eligible for a total of \$27,000 in federal urban planning funds.
